That is, we want to be obedient, trusting, believing Him in what He has said. Since Psalm 90 is our prayer, "teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom." Then let's do what He tells us to do in Isaiah 58:5-7, " Is it a fast that I have chosen, a day for a man to afflict his soul? Is it to bow down his head like a bulrush, and to spread out sackcloth and ashes? Would you call this a fast,

and an acceptable day to the Lord? "Is this not the fast that I have chosen: to loose the bonds of wickedness, to undo the heavy burdens, to let the oppressed go free, and that you break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and that you bring to your house the poor who are cast out; when you see the naked, that you cover him, and

not hide yourself from your own flesh?"

This is a short update on what Calvary Cares has been doing to redeem the time and help those who have need in our own community. Every two weeks, that is the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month, Calvary Cares is reaching our own with food, clothes and "The Bread of Life." A Word from Christain



Greetings!

It's time for another update from the student ministry.

We're still studying the doctrine of salvation on Sunday

mornings. Since the last newsletter, we've completed a study on regeneration (the reception of spiritual life in the place of spiritual death), conversion (the transition from unbelief to belief), and justification (the declaration of righteousness from God based on the exchange of Christ's righteousness for our guilt). Now we're discussing the adoption we've received from God the Father (the legal and relational change from being an enemy to a son or daughter of God). After that, we'll study sanctification, perseverance, and glorification, which will probably take the rest of June and July to complete.

On Sunday nights, we're still working our way through the Book of Proverbs. We're halfway through Chapter 22, so we're making progress. Themes include reputation, partiality and prejudice, prudence, humility, traps, parenting, slavery, justice, generosity, exile, politics, retribution, laziness, adultery, discipline, and oppression. And that's just half of this chapter. I pray these lessons stick while the students are still young.

On Wednesday nights, we completed our study on the Book of Colossians. Since then, we've returned to studying church history. A few months ago, we completed a study of the Church Fathers.

Now we're moving onto the next major period of church history. It's often called the Middle or Medieval Ages. Naturally, this period gets its name because it's in-between the Church Fathers and the Reformation, which are periods of history that Protestants typically love to study. Whereas, the Middle or Medieval period is often looked at as a period of compromise and demise. To be honest, I think the Church Fathers receive too much flattery and not enough flak for the Middle Ages. The Middle Ages was a reaping of what the church fathers sowed. However, it should also be said that the Middle Ages has good in it. Church history is messy regardless of the period, century, or decade discussed, and regardless of the figure or event discussed. There's always good and bad. That should be expected for two reasons. First, Christians are both sinners and saints, which will have good and bad results. And second, God is always at work in the church and in the world, which will include salvation and judgment. At the moment, we're focusing on the rise of Islam and its effect on the church and the world in the Middle Ages. It's amazing that a small band of religious outcasts became the leaders of an empire in 100 years. That happened partly because the church was both corrupted and divided along theological and political lines. Ideas have consequences. Biblical disobedience impacts both the church and the world.

For this month's youth event, we'll be having a pool party. It's time for a swim and a sun burn.
