It's time for another update from the student ministry.

First of all, we survived the rafting trip in September. It seems

On Sunday mornings, we finished the doctrine of humanity. We studied our divine origin, what it means to be made in God's image, that we are both bodies and souls, and that we have sinful natures, which fortunately, is a temporary reality for believers in Jesus. In October, we'll begin the doctrine of the church, which will actually be the last major doctrine to cover. After that, I think I'll focus on the storyline of Scripture, so that the students can see

That's because Romans is a very conceptual book, at least at the start.

Unfortunately, we had to cancel our camping and hiking trip for the end of September due to the weather. Hurricanes. I thought we would skip them this year. I thought wrong.


