Paul defines the Gospel in 1 Corinthians 15:3-4, "For I delivered to you first of all that which I also received: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that He

was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures." That is God's revelation of how we receive forgiveness of sins and get to heaven. God's plan was set before the foundation of the world, and it is in and through Christ alone. So, with the first quarter of this year going to be

John MacArthur says, "Yet with all their faults and character flaws – as remarkably ordinary as they were – these men carried on a ministry after Jesus' ascension that left an indelible impact on the world. Their ministry continues to influence us even today. God graciously empowered and used these men to inaugurate the spread of the gospel message and to turn the world upside down (Acts 17:6). Ordinary men – people like you and me – became the instruments by which Christ's message was carried to the ends of the earth. No wonder they are such fascinating characters."

There is a growing instability because of the many poor decisions that our government has made. People are feeling the squeeze at the gas pump, the grocery store, along with everything because of skyrocketing inflation. We believe that in God's providential time, "For such a time as this," the doors of Calvary Cares has opened and serving many families through-

out Unicoi County. The Calvary Cares Team wants to thank each and every person who has made this a possibility. We also invite you to come and share the love of Christ in a tangible way. The doors are open the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month at 1 PM. Come and expe-

Both should be switched on in us... Truth without grace breeds a self-righteousness legalism that poisons the church and pushes the world from Christ. Grace without truth breeds moral indifference and keeps people from seeing their need for Christ. Attempts to "soften" the gospel by minimizing truth keep people from Jesus. Attempts to "toughen" the gospel by minimizing grace keep people from Jesus. It's not enough for us to offer grace or truth. We must offer both." My prayer is that we will be strengthened by God's Word to be as Paul says, "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

Let us share the truth in love before time runs out,

Greetings, Calvary family!

It's time for another update from the student ministry!

On Sunday mornings, we finished our series on doctrines, which laid the

foundation for everything else. Now we started a series on the Christian Life. We began with the subject of evangelism, which ties in nicely with our efforts to get student-led evangelism clubs in the public schools. First, I showed the students YouTube videos of actual street evangelism taking place, so that they could see what it could look like. And then we started a video curriculum from Sam Chan called Evangelism in a Skeptical World. From it, we've discussed a lifestyle of everyday evangelism, moving from shallow to deeper conversations with friends, and we've discussed how to craft a gospel presentation to various kinds of people with different worldviews. It'll take us a few months to work through the video curriculum.

On Sunday evenings, we're still working our way through the Book of Romans. We've completed the more theological portions of the book. Now we're covering the more practical portions of the book. Both are needed, right thinking and right practice. And right practice flows out of right thinking.

On Wednesday evenings, we're still working our way through the Book of Psalms. We've completed Psalm 19, which is one of the better known psalms about the revelation of God in nature and the revelation of God in Scripture. We're currently working on Psalm 20. We had a Super Bowl party this month, which was a blast! Instead of watching the halftime show, we played Bingo with surprise prizes that the kids could trade with each other. I think they really enjoyed it. We had another Merge/First Priority Meeting at the YMCA. Unfortunately, snow tubing got canceled due to warmth and wetness.

Lately, I've been revisiting the works of Francis Schaeffer. He was a popular Christian philosopher and apologist at the latter part of the 20th century who focused on reaching young people for Jesus. Schaeffer really understood the times he was in, and he could see the trajectory they were headed in better than many others. This is why many who read him today consider him to have been prophetic. I can honestly recommend his 5-volume works to anyone. Schaeffer isn't that difficult to read or understand. If you do decide to buy his works, I recommend you begin with No Little People and True Spirituality. After those, I recommend He is There and He is Not Silent, How Should We Then Live, Art and the Bible, and Pollution and the Death of Man.

Please keep us in your prayers. Pray that the Lord draws lost students to salvation. Pray that God grows the saints in their belief, obedience, and worship. Pray that God enables us to get evangelism clubs or a culture of evangelism going in our public schools. Pray that God grows us in fellowship and service.

In your code of moral ethics does murder trump disobedience? Is Adam's disobedience in the garden equal to or less than

say, Cain killing Abel, in regards to sin? Is it the quality of the sin or maybe the quantity of sins that determines the punishment? What is the Biblical answer a believer should be able to articulate? We already know the decalogue in Exodus 20 says, "Thou shall not kill," or (murder). From this we deduce Cain to be guilty of sin against his brother and God. But what does the Bible say about being disobedient? Ephesians 2:16, "who were dead in trespasses and sins, in which you once walked according to this world order. . . the spirit who now works in the sons of disobedience." Those dead in trespasses and sins were, "not dead because of sinful acts that had been committed, but because of their Sinful Nature," says John MacArthur. He also

says, "disobedience is disbelief." So, Cain killing Abel did not make him a sinner. Cain killed Abel because Cain had a sin nature that dominated him. Cain is the perfect example of James 1:14-15. The four steps are, desire leads to deception, leads to design, which leads to disobedience. In conclusion, disobedience and disbelief are like two brothers of the same mother, the mother of Original Sin.

Someone has recently spoken this concept to me in a conversation about Answers in Genesis, "Cain committed the first sin and Adam and Eve were only disobedient." I strongly disagree with this interpretation! How would you counter this? I'm asking anybody who is inclined to write down 2-3 Biblical counter-points. Educate me and pray about my next divine appointment.

Dearest Church Family, This past month has flown by. We thank God for His love, mercy and grace. As we look


