Faithful to the End

The race of faith for the believer can at times become mountainous and fatiguing. God has designed it that way, and if you should ever doubt that, just read Hebrews 11. Yes, God tests His children; He tries authentic faith as He puts that faith through the fiery trials of life. As we have been going through the written prayers recorded in the Bible for the Wednesday night prayer meeting, we finished the Old Testament with Habakkuk praying and asking God in chapter 1:2-4, "O LORD, how long shall I cry, and You will not hear? Even cry out to You, "Violence!" and You will not save. Why do

You show me iniquity, and cause me to see trouble? For plundering and violence are before me; there is strife, and contention arises. Therefore the law is powerless, and justice never goes forth. For the wicked surround the righteous; therefore, perverse judgment proceeds." This is an

amazing reflection on the times he lived in that are incredibly contemporary- considering he wrote this over 2,600 years ago. But the lessons he learned in his time of testing led him to deeper worship, as it should for all who have authentic faith. This was the culmination of his praise in chapter 3:17-19, "Though the fig tree may not blossom, nor fruit be on the vines; though the labor of the olive may fail, and the fields yield no food; though the flock may be cut off from the fold, and there be no herd in the stalls—yet I will rejoice in the LORD, I will joy in the God of my salvation. The LORD God is my strength; He will make my feet like deer's feet, and He will make me walk on my high hills. To

the Chief Musician. With my stringed instruments."

When talking about the race of faith, the Scripture likens it to a marathon. This is the good news for the believer; someday the race will be over. This race does not go on and on with no end in sight. When a loved one who passes and dies in the faith, we often say that they finished their race. The Apostle Paul says it this way: "For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Finally,

there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give to me on that Day,
and not to me only but also to all who
have loved His appearing." We have
just finished the first quarter of the year
and have already said goodbye to
some wonderful people who finished

well and died in the Lord. We have opportunities to minister to the next generation. Let us be found faithful in making disciples, passing the baton to them as this race continues till the Lord returns. Please be in prayer for the summer events such as V.B.S., Summer camp, the mission trip to Wisconsin, and the local ministries of reaching our own community. Our race will be over before you know it, and we want to hear, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Greetings, Calvary family!

It's time for another update from the student ministry!

We have completed our Sunday morning series on evangelism. The closer we got to the end of the Evangelism in a Skeptical World series, the less I agreed with Chan's content. It

started to be more pragmatic (in accordance with man's arbitrary philosophy) and less principled (in accordance with God's Scriptures). And I disagreed with more of his theology, apologetics, and interpretations of Scripture as we got to the end of the series. Because of this, I didn't show several of the last videos to the students. Still, the series was useful altogether. We changed things up a bit. We discussed good principles of evangelism. We talked through disagreements I had with Chan's philosophy. And I think I modeled to the students how to use discernment when watching or listening to another teacher (act like Bereans and test everything with the Scriptures). After the series, I showed them common methods of telling the gospel, including the Creation, Fall, Redemption, New Creation approach; the God, Man, Christ, Response approach; the Romans Road approach; the Colors approach; and many others. In the end, I think the students have had an opportunity to develop a biblical theology of evangelism, and I think they've been trained on both long-term and short-term methods of evangelism. God uses both. I've seen people converted in one gospel conversation on the street. And I've seen people converted after a year of friendship and hospitality evangelism in the homes of Christian families. The next series we'll be working through is Spiritual Disciplines of the Christian Life. It'll remind the students of their own role in discipleship and give them some methods for growing in belief and obedience to Jesus.

We're getting close to the end of our series on Romans, which we've been studying on Sunday nights. After this, we'll study the Book of Hebrews. I like to rotate among different authors of the NT, so that the students don't only hear Paul (Romans-Philemon). If you'd like to better understand how the OT and NT fit together, I recommend you give some serious attention to Hebrews.

On Wednesday evenings, we're still working through our series on the Psalms. We're still covering different types of psalms. As I'm writing this, we're working through a Psalm of Trust in Psalm 27. After that, we'll spend a few weeks on a Royal Psalm, a Wisdom Psalm, and a Torah Psalm. One of the things we've seen is that several Psalms were explicitly written for the purpose of singing them for gathered worship. I'm not sure why churches got out of the practice of singing the Psalms, but I recommend

that we consider getting back to them at Calvary. They're literally God-inspired songs.

In April, we went to a Youth Rally at Central Baptist Church in Erwin; Scott Stodola gave a powerful testimony; I recommend you look into him. Olivia Manfull got to teach our girls one week as a school assignment, which I heard went well. We had another Merge event at the YMCA; we got to hear several testimonies from both students and adults in attendance; it's amazing the different times and ways that God reaches lost people with the gospel. We joined the children's ministry for the hike at White Oak Trail; the weather was perfect, and we had a very enjoyable time. As I'm writing this, we're preparing for the Student and Adult Worship Night at the end of April, which I'm sure will be edifying.

In May, we're planning on having the last Merge meeting on the 3rd. We're going to help with the Appalachian Trail Cookout on the 7th. We'll start helping Calvary Cares after school lets out on the 18th. And we're still working on a rafting trip and/or a Frisbee competition for the month of May.

For this month's book, I recommend Gary North's Political Polytheism. It might be the most thoughtprovoking book on American History and Politics that I've ever read. One of the things North does is contrast the vision for America from the Founders and the vision for America from the Framers. The Colonists were the Founders, and later the Constitutionalists were the Framers. The Colonists overwhelmingly made Christ the ruler of their colonies/states and made the Bible the explicit foundation for their colonies/states. Whereas the Framers intentionally left God, Christ, and the Bible out of the Constitution, and they intentionally made it such that America would be a pluralist nation with Article 6. Pluralism means that every religion is given equal rights and privileges; no religion is absolute over the others. This means that relativism was not only implicit but inevitable in America. Relativism is the belief in no absolute truths (except for relativism). With no absolute religion, there can be no absolute truth, because God is the foundation for all absolutes. This means the chaos we see today was always inevitable from the Constitution. Relativism can't produce anything but chaos. In light of this, the solution to our country's problems is conceptually simple: return to Christ as our explicit ruler and return to the Bible as the explicit foundation for our society. Unfortunately, getting back to that point will probably take a miraculous awakening or a very painful conflict. Still, Christ is king of kings and lord of lords. At some point, this land will bend the knee to Christ again. Let's pray and labor to that end. At the time of writing this, I still haven't finished the book, because I found that it's a book worth reading slowly (very few are). It's well worth your time.


